Career Summary and Qualifications:

I work on issues of social vulnerability and international policy relating to health, development and the environment. My graduate training was through a program which required mastering the theory and methods of three disciplines and applying them in a transdisciplinary project located in Latin America. My dissertation on changing malaria patterns in the Dominican Republic combined epidemiological research (surveys and surveillance) with spatial analysis (remotely-sensed data for discriminating land use associated with malaria and land use change) and ethnographic methods. Since graduation, I have worked on several NIH-funded clinical research projects relating to substance abuse, HIV/AIDS and health disparities, and contextual determinants of STDs in domestic, low-income, minority communities. My current research is on social vulnerability and health outcomes related to conflict in Sri Lanka, and resource loss, trauma and development related to extreme weather events. In addition to my post-graduate experience, I worked in project management for five years, and worked as a journalist for two years. I conducted independent research in the Dominican Republic, Ecuador and the United Kingdoms, and attended university in Japan.

My areas of expertise include advanced Geographic Information Systems (GIS) design and applications, intermediate remote-sensing methods and geospatial analysis, sustainable development, infectious disease epidemiology, contextual and environmental health, statistical analysis, and qualitative research methods. I also offer strong project management skills.

Research interests include the interaction between environment, policy and health; social vulnerability; environment, development, and conflict; tourism and well-being; and health disparities and social justice.
